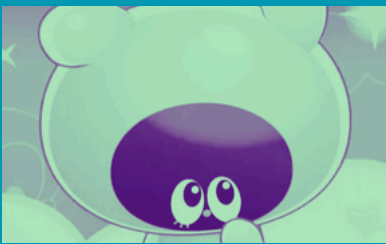

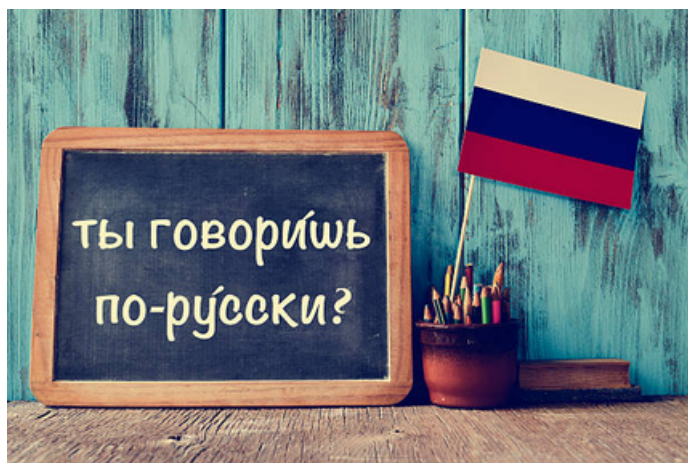


The Russian language is a major East Slavic language spoken primarily in Russia and across parts of Eastern Europe, Central Asia, and among diaspora communities worldwide. It's one of the most widely spoken languages in the world, with over 250 million speakers. It is one of the six official languages of the United Nations. Besides Russia, it's widely spoken in countries that were once part of the Soviet Union, such as Kazakhstan, Ukraine, and others.

Russian belongs to the Slavic languages, specifically the East Slavic group (alongside Ukrainian and Belarusian). About the Alphabet: Russian uses the Cyrillic alphabet, which has 33 letters.

Do you know what makes Russian distinctive: First of all about grammar: It has a rich system of cases (six main ones), which change word endings depending on their role in a sentence. Secondly about pronunciation: Stress is unpredictable and can change meaning. Thirdly of vocabulary: It has influences from Church Slavonic, as well as borrowings from French, German, and English.



Russian is the language of famous writers like Leo Tolstoy and Fyodor Dostoevsky, whose works are central to world literature.

In short, Russian is not just a national language—it's a globally influential language with deep historical, cultural, and political significance.

Most verbs exist in two forms: imperfective (ongoing/repeated) and perfective (completed action).

This concept is tricky for learners but very precise.

Russian loves making words “cuter” or more affectionate:

- кот (cat) → котик (kitty)
- мама (mom) → мамочка (mommy, affectionate)

During early space missions from the Soviet Union, Russian became the first language spoken in space—and it's still widely used on the International Space Station today.

Ever wondered what it would be like if you could pet a Tamagotchi? Well, those geniuses at Takara Tomy made that possible and Spin Master brought it to us on British turf.

Punirunes (name comes from Japanese “puni-puni” meaning squishy) are a squishy-feeling virtual pet toy you can squish with your own finger. They’re really tactile, and while you can’t connect to the internet or connect to other Punirunes like modern-day Tamagotchis, they are just as fun. Fun minigames, food cooking, cool characters...

I have a few grievances, though. The “cleaning” minigame is slow and tedious and while you can buy multiple amounts of food, you have to feed your pet food one-by-one.

However, the crucial Punirunes difference is that they don’t die, they just “melt” and disable some game modes until you squish them back into shape.

Overall, Punirunes are an addictive, tactile toy you should buy.

Also the mascot, Airun, is played by Megumi Han, who plays Gon in Hunter X Hunter and Nokotan in My Deer Friend Nokotan.

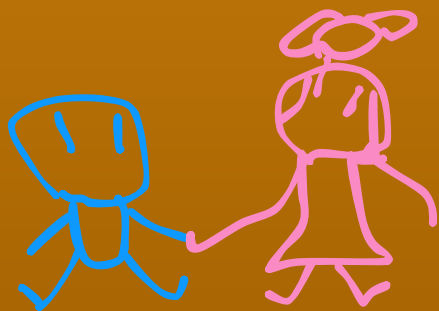
